Helen Hawes Hudgins & Our Newsletter

Helen Hawes Hudgins, co-founder of the Hawes Family Association and the original editor of the Hawes Family Association Newsletter died on December 25, 2003, in Franklin, Tennessee, after a short illness.

Mrs. Hudgins and Mrs. Anna Lucy Hawes Greaves met in person for the first time, at the Hawes Cemetery in Daviess County, Kentucky in 1989. They contacted other family members, after that meeting, and made plans to form the association and to publish a newsletter semi-annually. Both of them had a desire that became a mission, to preserve the family history of the Haweses and their allied families and to share it with other descendants. Mrs. Greaves died on March 27, 1999, in Louisville, Kentucky.

Mrs. Hudgins carried on, on her own, until the fall of 2000, when she passed the torch to Susan Foster and me. She will be greatly missed. jhs

Mrs. Throgmorton purchased a travel agency in 1967 and developed it into what is now known as International Tours.

Evelyn Louise Criss, the daughter of Lloyd and Lillian Criss, was born December 8, 1916, in West Virginia. As a child, she moved with her family to El Dorado and then to Gridley, where she attended school. She earned a full music scholarship to Baker University.

She married Col. Edwin Hugh Hawes in 1937. He was killed in 1945 during World War II while serving in the Pacific Theater. She married Air Force Lt. Col. A.W. Throgmorton at San Antonio, Texas, and they lived on Randolph AFB. After he retired in 1954, they moved to Emporia. He died March 9, 1963, of cancer caused by exposure to atomic bomb testing in the Pacific.

Mrs. Throgmorton was a member of St. Andrew Episcopal Church. She was an active member of the Eastern Star, Daughters of the American Revolution and Review Club and was a Colonial Dame. She supported music and theater and also was a genealogist.

She is survived by four sons, Jeffrey C. Hawes and Thomas L. Throgmorton of Emporia, Edwin H. Hawes of Dallas, Texas, and Kit Throgmorton of Edmond, Oklahoma; nine grandchildren; and six great-grandchildren. One brother, Paul Criss; and two sisters, Eula Phillips and Mary Endsley, died earlier.

She was a songwriter contracted with Acuff-Rose, a charter member of Pioneer Club and a member of United Daughters of the Confederacy.

Mrs. Hudgins was preceded in death by her husband, Ward Hudgins, a local attorney and former U.S. District Attorney for the Middle Tennessee District, who died in 1966 and her daughter, Robin Hudgins Cashman, CLU.

She is survived by her sons, Mike Hudgins of Maury County and Tom Hudgins of McEwen, Tennessee; Elaine Hudgins Husband of Franklin, Tennessee; brothers, W.E. Hawes of Leonardtown, Maryland and James E. Hawes of Oakland, Maryland; sister, Lillian Hawes Meeks of Arlington, Virginia, Martha Hawes Blythe of Boroni, Florida and Dorothy Hawes Newkirk of Lakeland, Florida; ten grandchildren; and twelve great grandchildren.

Survices were conducted on Sunday, December 28, 2003 at Williamson Memorial Funeral Home with Phil Husband officiating. Interment was at Mount Hope Cemetery.

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Helen May Hawes Hudgins was the great-great-granddaughter of Richard & Clary Walker Hawes of Kentucky. She was one of the people who pushed for and got a State Historical marker at the Hawes Cemetery, near Yelvington, KY.

This is a plea to those of you whom may not have paid your dues for several years. Please pay. If you are unable to pay, I understand and will not discontinue sending your newsletters on that account. But our bank balance is not going to last, if there are only a few family members paying. Some of you have paid several years in advance and some, by purchasing memorial memberships, have contributed more.

Helen Hawes Hudgins warned me when she passed the newsletter to me, that there would be times like this. The membership list she passed to me had gone down to 32 members, due to deaths of members and dwindling interest. Our membership grew to over one-hundred in the past four years. But it is now getting smaller, for similar reasons. We need new members. We need dues paid. We need donations.

I did change the newsletter to quarterly issues when I took over and I have tried to keep it interesting for all of our members. Perhaps I have failed in that respect. I did not and do not believe that there needs to be an increase in the price per year, nor do I believe that the increase in postage last year caused this need to beg. But for the first time since I took over writing the newsletter four years ago, our bank balance is decreasing in size. I haven't expected it to increase in size, but for the first 3 years the amount in our account remained steady. Without a positive change, I will be able to continue for approximately two more years.

Betty Ann Smiddy-Buckner recently stopped publishing *The Buckner Newsletter*, one of the best I have ever read, due to similar problems. I don't want that to happen to us. Will you help?

Purpose of The Hawes Family Association:

To continue to collect and preserve family histories of Hawes people and allied families; to share our knowledge of family histories and to strengthen extended family ties.

The Calhoon/Calhoun's of Calhoun, Kentucky

Corilla Calhoun, second wife of Hugh Walker Hawes and daughter-in-law of Richard & Clary Walker Hawes, is a member of this Calhoon family.

George Calhoon, born February 1, 1754 in Pennsylvannia, served in the Revolutionary War, rising in rank to Captain. He married twice, first Susan Cotton the daughter of Judge Cotton and second Mary Gilmore. Both marriages took place in Daviess County, Ohio, in what became Daviess County, Kentucky. George came to Daviess County and bought land six miles southwest of Yellow Banks (Owensboro); died October 20, 1835. George & Susan were the parents of four children; Ralph Cotton, Samuel; John; and Elizabeth.

John Calhoon (1793-1852), their third child, was a lawyer, State Representative, Circuit Judge, and U.S. Congressman. John married Mary Morton daughter of Richard Morton and his wife Mahetabel (Luce?). They were the parents of; Corilla, William, Margaret, Isaac, Atella Mehetabel, & Irene Jane.

John Calhoon is listed in Herringshaw's Encyclopedia of American Biography. The entry shows: "Calhoun, John, jurist, congressman, was born in Kentucky. For many years he was a circuit judge; in 1820 and 1821 was a member of the legislature from Ohio County, and in 1829, 1830, and 1840, a member of the same from Breckenridge County. He was a representative in congress from Kentucky from 1835 to 1839. The county-seat of McLean County was named for him in 1852."

Calhoon, in McLean County, Kentucky was later changed to the present spelling of Calhoun. It is my opinion that the spelling was changed to honor one of the famous John C. Calhoun's. But irregardless of why the spelling of the name of the town was changed, some of John Calhoon's descendants may have used the Calhoun spelling themselves after that change. The Calhoun spelling appears often in numerous records for them. Our own family records show that the maiden name of the wife of Hugh Walker Hawes was Calhoun.

Reverand Daniel Marshall (1706-1784)

Reverand Daniel Marshall was the founder of the Baptist ministry in the State of Georgia.

India Hall, the great-great-granddaughter of Walker Leighton Hawes (1833-1894), while a college freshman in Georgia traced her direct lineage back to Rev. Marshall. Her research was done as part of her freshman English class.

Mary Virginia Marshall, great-granddaughter of Reverand Daniel Marshall, married James Newton Hawes in 1856. Both James and Mary Virginia Marshall Hawes are buried in the cemetery at New Hope Baptist Church in Lincoln County, Georgia.

In 1861, Walker L. Hawes, ancestor of James, reorganized the Sunday School at New Hope and a banner was made, "God is Love - New Hope S.S.. That banner is stored in the family archives.

A future newsletter will carry more information about both our Georgia and New York City Baptist connections.

Great work.

A special thank you to Jeffrey C. Hawes and to Elaine Husband, for informing me of the deaths of their dear mothers, and to Celia Hawes Taylor for taking time from her mourning to advise me of the untimely death of her husband Jerry, from cancer.

Fortunately for me, I spoke with Helen Hawes Hudgins many times by telephone, and along with my Aunt Marjorie Hawes and later my cousin Molly Hawes Rader, visited with her, in person in Franklin, Tennessee. She spent many hours sharing family history with us, and being a lovely hostess, as we journeyed to Kentucky in the summers of 2000 & 2001.

Jeffrey C. Hawes's mother Louise Criss Hawes Throgmorton came into my life by telephone, shortly after I started writing the newsletter. I knew of her already. She was an early member of the Hawes family association and a frequent correspondent to Mrs. Hudgins. Edwin Hugh Hawes, her first husband, was killed in action during the final week of World War II. He was a first cousin to my father, Lloyd Clark "Buck" Hawes, and to daddy's siblings. Uncle Joe and daddy relayed many stories to me, of growing up with Edwin and working cattle together on Matagorda Island, at the Hawes family's ranch. One day shortly after I took over writing the newsletter, I answered my telephone in Corpus Christi. The voice at the other end of the line boomed out, "Is this Joanne Hawes?" Not having been called Joanne Hawes for over forty years, I hesitated, and then said, "yes". Mrs. Throgmorton then continued, "Well, if you are Joanne Hawes, why did you hesitate?" Her call began a lovely association, but I have always laughed when I remembered our shaky beginning. She loved her Hawes ties and never forgot them.

The summer of 2002, on our trip to Maryland, Virginia, & Washington, D.C., Molly Hawes Rader & I had the good fortune to meet and visit with Jerry & Celia Hawes Taylor. Jerry & Celia invited us for a visit at their home in Leonardtown, Maryland in advance of our planned joint trip to Woodpecker, the home built by Samuel Hawes II, in Caroline County, Virginia in 1750. We had not met in person before, but you would not have thought that, if you had seen how gracious they both were. And even though Celia was the Hawes descendant, Jerry appeared to enjoy our visit to Woodpecker as much as we did. He took some wonderful pictures that day and asked as many questions as any in our group. It was obvious that he appreciated what Woodpecker meant to Celia, Molly, Pat Hawes, & me. Later we all had lunch together. Jerry was a fine and soft-spoken man. He is shown in the pictures included in the July 2002 newsletter, with our group at Woodpecker, with his wonderful smile that I remember so much. He died on March 13, 2004, but his obituary was not yet available for this newsletter. If I can get it, I will include it next quarter. Jerry was buried at Arlington National Cemetery on March 25th. He will be missed.

I am moving to Victoria, Texas on April 6th. My duties here are not complete and I will have to come back occasionally. But I am going to set up an apartment in Victoria now. I miss my family. My new mailing address is shown on page 6. Next newsletter, I will have a new telephone number and perhaps a new email address. For now, I am continuing with my dial-up service with Earthlink.
