She was one of the partners of the Hawes Cattle Company on Matagorda Island, Texas and a member of the Seadrift Methodist Church.

Funeral Services for Chief Master Sgt. Loren J. "Mac" McNeley were held in the chapel of Boone Funeral Home, Tuesday, July 27, 2004, at 10:00 AM. Officiating was Reverend Robert Goetjen of Faith Temple Assembly. Full military honors followed at Hill Crest Memorial Park. The family received friends at the funeral home Monday evening from 6-8 PM. CMSgt. McNeley passed away on Thursday, July 22, 2004 at his home after a lengthy illness.

He was born on December 22, 1931, in Winterset, Iowa to Russell and Irma King McNeley. Mr. McNeley grew up in Omaha, Nebraska and graduated from Benson High School in 1949, where he lettered in baseball, basketball and football. The Brooklyn Dodgers Baseball Organization drafted him after high school. Later he moved on to the St. Louis Cardinals before joining the Air Force. CMSgt. **Richard Joseph "Dick" Haase
(1913-2004)**

Bettylou Haase Ross, when asked for more information about her father recently, wrote this lovely tribute.

Dad was not a person who expressed emotions or feelings easily, but I was always absolutely certain of his love as a child by the way he was always willing to help me with anything or get involved in any project I needed help with. This never changed, as I grew older.

Dad was a do-er and a thinker and an explainer. He was interested in absolutely everything, as we could see when we would travel together. Whether it was birds, geological formations, how some apparatus worked, the history of a location - he had to learn the details - and he remembered them.

He loved to travel and was in incredibly good health until last October. Over the last five years, he went white-water rafting on the Colorado River, toured the Alps (even a very small amount of skiing - he skied quite a bit when he was younger), and took a cruise to Antarctica. He drove from Texas to visit family in California and Canada two or three times a year, in his 2000 Mustang (We said he bought this in his midlife crisis.) He would visit our family and help with the endless renovations and projects that we have (mostly because of our handicapped child, Bernie.) He really could fix just about anything and had an amazing energy level. Dad was always a generous man - willing to help when anyone (not just family) needed a hand.

In his work, he was an Exploration Geophysicist for Shell Oil. (In other words, he was a part of the team that looked for oil deposits.) He would sometimes travel to places like Alaska or Malaysia to try out some new piece of equipment he had designed or invented, to see if it actually worked. He loved his work but enjoyed it less in later years, I think, as things became more computer-oriented and less 'hands-on'. He retired in 1978.

Dad and Mom lived most of their married life in Houston, Texas, from maybe 1950 to 1995, tho' Mom died (pneumonia) in 1988. They were always focused on family and a few close friends and associates. (Most friends predeceased him, of course.) Dad was actually a very shy person - not shy with family of course, but he wasn't that outgoing and was never really interested in any clubs or organizations. The Hawes Family Association was probably the sole organization he was a member of. His hobby was definitely 'fixing things.' He also loved genealogy and tracing our roots.

Dad was born just outside Chicago (in Oak Park.) His mom Virginia Taylor (who was from Owensboro, Kentucky) committed the then unthinkable sin of falling in love with a Yankee (she met Elmer Haase at University of Illinois). Virginia and Elmer had three children - Robert (Bob) who was killed in an accident in 1996, Dad, and sister Eleanor. Eleanor Haase and Lucile Goudy were best friends - so that's how mom and dad met. Elmer died suddenly while Dad was in college (University of Colorado), and Virginia moved home to Owensboro some time after that (not exactly sure when) and lived in town for many years. There was a tobacco farm on the Ohio near Maceo which her family, the Taylors, owned for several generations. I have fond memories of visiting my grandmother Haase in the 1960s and meeting cousins in the Owensboro area.

Last October, Dad was visiting our family as usual – he usually spent a month with us, twice a year. (We live in Guelph, Ontario, which is near Toronto.) He ate something that upset his stomach, and was really ill for a few days, and his back began to be very painful. He was far too ill to travel back to Texas, and eventually we took him to the hospital. He had pneumonia, and endured many tests as they tried to determine the cause of the pain. It was either arthritis or (more probably) metastatic bone cancer – quite a roller coaster for us all for several weeks. He eventually stabilized enough to get back home to Texas just before Christmas (he didn't care for that Canadian winter) and began some cancer treatment which was not at all effective and quite uncomfortable. He went up and down for a few months, and eventually just went down. He was happy to be able to stay in his own home with 24 hour in-home nursing care until the very last day. Both of my brothers kept close watch, and many family members came to visit in the last months. I think we all (and he too) knew he would not recover – he said as much to me in May (which was remarkable because we just don't talk about those things in our family.) The morning of July 28th, he wouldn't wake up and they took him to the hospital. He never recovered consciousness and had passed on before supertime.

In January 2003, for my dad's 90th birthday, the whole family gathered in San Antonio to celebrate his life. About forty people were there. We are all very glad we took that time with him to celebrate. He lived a long, happy, full and healthy life. We gathered again on August 28, 2004 exactly one month after his death, to bury his ashes in the Hawes Family cemetery, in Daviess County, Kentucky.

FAMILY TREE DNA TESTING MAY PROVIDE ENGLISH ROOTS of Samuel Hawes I (Caroline County, Virginia)

Family, we have reached a point where we may never learn the identity of the ancestors of our Virginia line of Haweses, if we take no action. I once thought that just any day we would find records stored in an old trunk in someone's attic, that would have answers to questions about our English ancestors. I thought that the burned records of the Caroline County, Virginia courthouse could be supplemented. I don't believe that any more. Many researchers of our Hawes line also believe now that we will never know how we connect back to our English roots. I really want to know. I don't want to accept the possibility that we may never make that connection. Many of you feel the same, I think.

Family Tree DNA testing is being used now to find connections to ancestors in many families. Recently a fellow researcher told me of DNA testing that was done in two of the lines in his family, with success. I want to have a DNA study done of our Virginia Hawes line. I have looked into the possibility and believe that it is feasible.

The testing company controls Family Tree DNA Testing. They mail out testing kits to the participants for simple, self-administered, swabs of the inside of the cheek and those kits are then mailed directly back to the company for testing and comparison to the other persons tested in the group. It isn't cheap. A 37-marker test is \$289.00 per person tested. That is the test that we want. But wait, am I'm getting ahead of myself? We can't test everyone in England, now can we?

First, we will need to identify an English family that we believe may be our ancestors and find living descendants of that family. I may have accomplished that already. I have descendants of a certain John Hawes of Ipswich, Suffolk County, England in mind. The son of one of his descendants came to Virginia on October 3, 1639 as the headright of Richard Parsons, with a grant of four hundred and fifty acres, in the lower county of New Norfolk, near the head of the Elizabeth River. I am in contact with some of this John Hawes' descendants; some are still living in England, one in Canada, and at least one in the United States. I am planning for a DNA Family Tree Study early next year. Two of the descendants, of the Suffolk County Hawes man are willing to participate in a DNA study, if we have one. I am looking for a third.

Next, we need three Samuel Hawes (1st) descendants, preferably male line descendants. Joe D. Hawes of Port O'Connor, Texas (my uncle) wants to be one of the volunteers. I would like two other volunteers, another descendant of Richard & Clary Walker Hawes and at least one Isaac Hawes, Sr. descendant. Surely, there are other Hawes surnamed males in our family willing to participate.

Next, through my colleague Raymond G. Hawes, author of "Edmund Hawes and His Descendants" and other family history books, I was able to get two volunteers from the family of Edmund Hawes of Massachusetts, namely descendants of John Hawes and Desire Gorham. They are most often named as our possible ancestors.

This is a real family. Richard Hawes born in circa 1606 came to Virginia on October 3, 1639 as the headright of Richard Parsons and received patents for four hundred and fifty acres in the lower Norfolk County, at the head of the Elizabeth River. This Hawes family can be traced back to the mid twelve-hundreds in England. But is it our family? Frank Mortimer Hawes, descendant of the Richard Hawes who came to the colonies on the ship Truelove in 1635 thought so. He had done extensive research on this family, thinking they were his and he proved them not to be his family. I think they are our family, but only DNA testing will prove it.

We are always looking for new members for our association. The young are so busy living their lives; I know that it isn't easy to gain their interest. But many of our distant cousins simply are not aware of the Hawes Family Association formed in 1989, for the purpose of collecting and preserving family histories of our Hawes and allied families, and sharing our knowledge of our family history. Please help me keep our membership rolls full. Helen Hawes Hudgins gave many years of her life to this endeavor and so have many others.

The hurricanes in Florida have wreaked havoc on that area and many family descendants have spent this storm season running from storms. Mrs. Martha Blythe of Punta Gorda, Florida, sister of Helen Hawes Hudgins and association member for many years, lost her home to hurricane Charley.
