OUR LOVED ONES, GONE AHEAD TO A BETTER PLACE, TO WAIT FOR US Dave S. McCoy – Refugio, Texas

Dave Sylvester McCoy, 82, passed away Saturday, November 6, 2004. He was born December 31, 1921, in Victoria, Texas to the lated Dave S. Sr. and Norma Hildegard McCoy. He attended Rice University and received his Bachelor of Science Degree at Southern Methodist University in Dallas. He received his Master's Degree at Sam Houston State University in Huntsville. He taught at Victoria Junior College and was a swim instructor at Pleasure Isle Pool and the Denver Hotel. He moved to Refugio in 1951 and was football coach at Refugio High School. In 1953, he married Lorraine Myers of Refugio, Texas. They moved to Port Lavaca where he coached; and in 1967 they moved back to Refugio where he served as school administrator and teacher until his retirement in 1988. He was a member of First Baptist Church.

He is survived by his wife, Lorraine McCoy of Refugio; daughters, Pamela LaPlante of Plano and Denise Light of Calgary, Canada; sons Dave S. McCoy III of Fort Collins, Colorado, Steve McCoy of Midland; Robert M. "Bob" McCoy of Bertram; sister Elizabeth Hawes of Victoria; nine grandchildren and six nieces.

Funeral services were held on Wednesday, November 10, 2004 at 2:00 p.m. at First Baptist Church in Refugio with Rev. David Parks officiating. Interment followed at Oakwood Cemetery in Refugio.

Julia Clark Whelan passed from this world on November 10, 2004. She was born on August 29, 2004 in Elgin, Illinois. Her birth announcement appeared in the last issue of our newsletter.

Julia was the daughter of Michael Patrick and Eleanor Chouteau Bond Whelan of Elgin, Illinois and the sister of young Frederick Whelan. Her grandparents Richard and Christy Hawes Bond of Wayne, Illinois are long-time association members and she was the 5th great-granddaughter of Richard and Clary Walker Hawes and the 6th great-granddaughter of William and Julia Clark.

Julia Clark Whelan had appeared to be in perfect health and her loss is especially sad. Below is a short tribute written by Julia's grandmother Christy Hawes Bond.

Julia Clark Whelan August 29, 2004 – November 10,2004

Her survivors are very sad to report the death on November 10th of Julia Clark Whelan, daughter of Eleanor Bond and Michael Patrick Whelan of Elgin, Illinois, from sudden infant death syndrome. Not twelve weeks old, Julia was much loved by family and friends, especially her eighteen-month old brother Freddie (Frederick William Whelan). Julia's engaging smile, early at six weeks, touched all who knew her. Ellie and Mike have become active with a local SIDS organization. Julia was the great granddaughter of Richard Simrall Hawes, III, of St. Louis, who was in turn the great grandson of Richard and Clara (Walker) Hawes.

HAWES DNA STUDY

Shortly after your October newsletter was in the mail, a DNA study to attempt to find our Hawes family's connection back to our English ancestors was begun.

"Our primary goal is to identify the English roots of Samuel Hawes I, the Virginia Hawes line ancestor living in colonial Virginia in 1704, when he left the Quit Rent Rolls.

A secondary goal of our study as we proceed is to help participants, not already familiar with their Hawes roots, to identify with their particular Hawes group. We now realize that patterns will develop as more Hawes surnamed males are tested."

The paragraph above contains a version of the stated goals for the Hawes DNA study posted at our website on the Internet, although our newsletter will keep you up-to-date. Those of you having access to the Internet may find the web page to follow the study by going online to the following URL:

Participants so far are: descendants of Isaac Hawes, Sr. and Samuel Hawes II, the two sons of Samuel Hawes I of Caroline County, Virginia; a descendant of John Hawes & his wife Desire Gorham (John is the only son of Edmond Hawes of Massachusetts, "the cutler arriving there in 1635 on the ship James"); and descendants of John Hawes of Suffolk County, England.

The Suffolk County, England descendants participating in our study are very excited about the possibility of a match to our Virginia Hawes line and they look forward to adding a whole new line to their family history. They have long believed that there were colonial American descendants of their family, but they just haven't been able to identify them. They have been generous with their family history and participation. The group of cousins in their family that I am in touch with wanted to be tested, but only two have the Hawes surname. Those two have tested; one lives in England and the other in Australia.

The descendant of John Hawes & Desire Gorham, taking part in our study, is an individual who values his privacy. But he was willing to be tested so that we might prove or disprove a connection to his ancestors. Raymond G. Hawes, author of "Edmond Hawes and his American Descendants" and other family history books, helped me locate this Hawes gentleman.

Enough results of testing are not available for comparison to other Hawes lines at this time. But we may begin to see matches as early as the latter part of January, as more results are returned from the University of Arizona laboratory. Joe D. Hawes of Port O'Connor, Texas, my uncle, was the first participant to volunteer and to return his self-administered test and our eldest participant so far is William E. Hawes of Leonardtown, Maryland, the elder brother of Helen Hawes Hudgins and one of the earliest members of our Hawes Family Association. Joe D. & William E. Hawes matched each other exactly on the first 12-markers. We have a few other volunteers waiting for DNA test kits. We need more. Participants in the current study must be Hawes surnamed and male. For every Hawes surnamed man saying yes to testing, there have been ten saying no. But as the study proceeds and more Hawes men are tested, we should find patterns that will help us identify our English connection. As a by-product of the study, we may help other Hawes people identify their English ancestry, even though it may differ from ours.

The name of each participant <u>will not</u> be posted on our web page with results. The results of testing are for comparison to each other, to find DNA matches back many generations into the past.

A few participants have paid for their own tests. I have paid for some of them from personal funds. You may donate funds for this DNA study and they will be appreciated. One Y-DNA 37 marker test costs \$229.00 + \$2.00 shipping and handling. Donations will provide funding for more participants in this on-going study.

The children of Samuel and Elizabeth Anne Spencer Hawes were born in this order, according to tradition: Isaac, Mary, Elizabeth, Eunice and Samuel II. With the exception of Eunice "Nicey" we know less about their daughters, than their sons. They are not listed on pages 5 & 6 in birth order because I had to make them fit into the available space. There must be information somewhere that will add to what we know about the sisters of Isaac Hawes, Sr. and Samuel Hawes II.

Mary married Elijah Daniel, the son of William Daniel, Jr. and Elizabeth Coleman. I would like to know where Mary's mother-in-law fits into the Coleman family. I do not know the names of any of Mary's grandchildren and I am not sure that all of her children are listed.

Elizabeth married Thomas Coghill, the youngest child of Frederick & Sarah Goss Coghill. Thomas's older sister Mary married Isaac Hawes, Sr. We can trace some of Elizabeth's descendants to the 5th generation. The second wife of Elizabeth's son William Coghill was Kezia Coleman, daughter of Thomas & Millicent Winn Coleman. One grandson, William Goodwin Coghill married Polly Samuell, the daughter of Anthony & Sarah Coleman Samuell. One granddaughter Elizabeth A. Coghill married Thomas B. Coleman on 09 Dec 1798. Whom are the parents of Thomas B. Coleman?

Nicey married John Coleman, Sr., the son of Robert & Mary Clayton Coleman. We have up to nine generations of her descendants, the most for any of the Samuel Hawes I daughters.

Most likely all of the Colemans connected by marriage to the three daughters of Samuel & Elizabeth Anne Spencer Hawes can be traced back to a common ancestor. Someone may already have traced that connection. Have you?
