

Martin Lammert IV - Creve Coeur, Missouri

Martin Lammert IV died on December 25, 2004, in Missouri. He was the son of the late Martin Lammert III and his wife Mary Bartow Hawes; grandson of Richard Simrall Hawes; great-grandson of Smith Nicholas Hawes; great-grandson of Richard Hawes II; and 3rd great grandson of Richard & Clary Walker Hawes. He was a new member of our Hawes Family Association and also the uncle of Christy Hawes Bond; she furnished the following obituary.

Martin Lammert IV knew furniture. Chairman and president of the well-know Lammert Furniture Co., Mr. Lammert was a nationally known innovator in the furniture business. He forecast retail trends and helped to design and establish new lines of products for the furniture industry for more than 40 years.

But Mr. Lammert also knew photography, war, hunting, health insurance, education and collecting.

Mr. Lammert, the fifth St. Louis generation of his family to lead the company, died Christmas morning, December 25, 2004, of respiratory failure. He was 81.

Mr. Lammert was born in St. Louis in 1923. In World War II, he served under the famous Gen. George S. Patton as a master sergeant. After the war, he attended Brown University. Upon returning to St. Louis, he married Alice Cornelia Thompson in 1948. They were together until her death in 2001.

He also went to work in his family's business, which was founded in 1839. He lead the business from 1973 until his retirement in 1996.

Mr. Lammert, who won several awards for his work as an amateur photographer, was sought by furniture manufacturers across the nation for his expertise in design and trends.

"He had many furniture manufacturers who would call him for ideas on what would sell well," said his oldest son, Richard T. Lammert.

Mr. Lammert specialized in reproductions of American furniture that had been made by craftsmen in New England from the 1740s to the 1850s. He designed lines for many furniture manufacturers, including Baker Furniture, Kittenger Furniture and Kindel Furniture.

He was an avid hunter who often was accompanied by his sons and his late sister, Jane Lammert Pettus, to St. Charles County, where they hunted duck, quail and doves.

Mr. Lammert served as a director on the Blue Cross Blue Shield board from 1968 to 1982. He also served as a director on the boards of St. Louis Country Day School and Mary Institute, General Bancshares, Downtown St. Louis Inc., the National Retail Panel for House Beautiful magazine, the Ranken Jordan Home, what is now the United Way, the Better Business Bureau and Lammert Furniture Realty Co.

Mr. Lammert was also a collector of pipes, hats and Russian objects.

A funeral Mass was celebrated at 10 a.m. Wednesday, December 29, 2005, at Our Lady of the Pillar Catholic Church. Burial was private at Bellefontaine Cemetery immediately after Mass.

In addition to his son, among the survivors are two other sons, Martin Lammert V of Ladue, who currently runs the company, and Frederic L.T. Lammert of Creve Coeur; two daughters, Bartow Hawes Lammert Molloy of Webster Groves and Pollie Lammert Hughes of Ladue; and seven grandchildren.

In lieu of flowers, memorial contributions may be made to the Ranken Jordan Home, Mary Institute and St. Louis Country Day School or the Kidney Foundation of Eastern Missouri.

Driving Directions from Owensboro, Kentucky to the Reunion

Out of Owensboro, take U.S. Hwy 60 east, going towards Hawesville. After you pass the Steelmill and Darmic (a chemical plant), both on them are on the left side of the highway; continue on until you see Hwy 2830 on your right. Turn right onto Hwy 2830; continue on to Maceo and turn right onto Hwy 405 (you will then cross the railroad tracks and see a beautiful mural painted on the side of a brick building). Travel on Hwy 405, until you reach Hwy 662; turn left onto Hwy 662. Travel about a half-mile on Hwy 662, until you reach Yelvington-Grandview Road, which will be on your left. Turn left onto Yelvington-Grandview Road and the second house on the left will be the home of Jim & Susan Foster, our hosts. [When you are driving on Yelvington-Grandview Road, if you reach Hwy 334, you went too far.]

Will of Albert Gallatin Hawes (1805-1849)

Daviess County Public Library in Owensboro, Kentucky had a transcript of this will in their Hawes files, transcribed by a Mr. Jerry R. Hurley, of Indianapolis, Indiana, in 1990. Albert G. Hawes was born April 1, 1805 and he died March 14, 1849; he was the son of Richard and Clary Walker Hawes of Kentucky.

In the name of God, amen. I Albert G. Hawes being of sound mind do make this my last will and Testament, hereby revoking all others. First I will to my wife Adelle one third part of my estate during [her] life and the residue of my estate to be equally divided among my children. My will is that out of the third part of Negroes that shall be allotted to my wife, she shall have fee simple, Negroes to the value of two thousand dollars. My will is that my children are to be educated and as they marry or become of age that they have their portion severally allotted to them. That my bonds shall be collected and the money after deduction of my wife's third, be loaned out at not more than six percent interest, and that my brothers shall have preference if they should wish to borrow. That in selecting schools for my children I wish my brothers to advise with my wife as to a suitable school for my children, but that if there is a difference, my wife shall have the selection. I appoint as executor of this my last will and Testament my wife and brothers, Hugh Walker, Edwin and Benjamin Hawes. In witness whereof I have affixed my name this 1st day of March 1849.

In addition to the preceding will I make this Codicil. My will is that my Executors sell the track of land allotted to me in the division of the Estate of my mother [Clary Walker Hawes] and known as the Iron Hill tract, and put the money to interest as in the preceding Will, and also I will that if in a settlement between my brother William and my executors he should be indebted to my estate they release the debt and not require the payment of the same whatever amount it may be. In witness whereof I affix my hand this 5th day of March 1849.

The foregoing writing was produced in court and duly proven to be the last Will and Testament of Albert G. Hawes deceased by the oaths of R.W. Murray and Wm. C. Woolfolk subscribing witnesses.

The DNA study now has sixteen participants. We are awaiting results from the following; two Hawes in England; Raymond G. Hawes of Connecticut, the author of many genealogy books about Hawes lines; a descendant of the Richard Hawes who came of the ship True Love, in 1635; and another Hawes from Nebraska. Not any matches back to England, so far.

A Good Trip to Kentucky

Robert B. "Bob" Powers, Jr. of Utah, one of our newest members, just returned from a visit to Kentucky to visit some of the places his ancestors once lived. Bob is a direct descendant of Albert Gallatin Hawes and his second wife Adele Combe. Their daughter Clara Hawes II married Joshua Dever Powers, a well-known businessman, in Kentucky. Joshua D. and Clara lived for years in Hawesville in Hancock County before relocating to Louisville, Kentucky. Joshua was the son of Stephen Powers, an early citizen of Hawesville. Before his trip, I asked him to write about his visit there for this issue of our newsletter.

I am back from a good trip to Kentucky. Most of my time was spent in Hancock County. I was only in Owensboro for two days and didn't get as much accomplished there as I had hoped. The weather was less than wished for. I wanted to stop and visit the Hawes cemetery at Yelvington and by the time I got to Maceo the rain had become a downpour, so I decided not to stop. I did have a good visit there last year so I wasn't completely disappointed. When I called them, Lindy & Abbie Mercer were not at home. I did spend some good hours at the Kentucky Room, at the Daviess County Public Library. I had most of their Hawes material already, but I did find some good and new information on the Powers family. So, the trip was somewhat successful. I decided, upon my return, that I would need more than four or five days to do good research.

I really enjoyed being in Hawesville...as you know, it is a small town and has a very warm atmosphere...the people have that southern hospitality down to a science. I met many people, while "digging" for info there and found them to be very helpful. I have called several upon my return and enjoyed visiting with them. I think my most enjoyable time, in Hawesville, was just wandering the streets and looking at the old buildings and homes. There were several times that I was just "transported" back to an earlier time and imagined horses and buggies on the streets and people dressed in late 1800s dress. I also drove out and around the county to look at historic sights. I may have mentioned that my great-great-grandfather, Stephen Powers, came to Hawesville in 1840 from Cincinnati. He married twice and had lots of children. There are about four generations buried at the old graveyard on the hill overlooking Hawesville.

Two or three homes, in Hawesville, associated with my family have all disappeared; however, my great-great-grandfather's store and bank buildings are still there. I found out that Stephen Power's store was the first brick building in Hawesville. Previous frame buildings were ravaged by fire and flood. My most difficult challenge, and one that was not successful, was to try to locate living descendants of Stephen Powers still living in Hancock County. That will have to wait for another trip in a couple of years. I did have wonderful help with my research from Mary Gibbs, the archivist in the old Courthouse, and from Denise Greathouse at the Hawesville City Hall.

All in all, it was a good trip. I wish that I could have spent more time in Daviess County. I did have a good experience visiting my great-grandfather's old home on Fredericka Street in Owensboro...got lots of good pictures of the interior as well. I am already looking forward to my next trip to Kentucky. I hope that it will be for at least two weeks.

He married (1) SUSAN AYLETT HAWES Apr 1833, daughter of WALKER HAWES and MARY MARTIN. She was born 19 Feb 1816 at "Vermont" in King William County, Virginia, and died Abt. 1839 in Kentucky. He married (2) ADELE COMBE 17 Oct 1841 in Kentucky, daughter of JOHN COMBE and HELENE BERTHOUD. She was born 1822 in St. Thomas, Virgin Islands. [Her sister Aurelia Combe m. Wm. Franklin Hawes.] Children of ALBERT HAWES and SUSAN HAWES are:

This last quarter has been a busy one for me. Ancestry.com now includes access to many United States censuses, as well as those of the United Kingdom. This provides an opportunity for me to add more information to my family data and has been keeping me busy. Also, the

DNA study takes a fair amount of my time.

My sister Joy Bunch, of Scottsdale, Arizona, found the burial place of our maternal great-great grandmother, Amelia Ann Cobb Boak online. Earlier this month she and Brenda Joehnk, her daughter, went there to take pictures and leave flowers. Seventh Street Cemetery in Benson, Cochise County, Arizona is where Amelia Ann Cobb Boak rests; she died October 25, 1893 in the Arizona Territory, five days after giving birth to an infant son. Her son lived only ten hours and he is buried next to her. This left our great-great grandfather Christopher Boak with a little girl, of less than two years of age, to raise alone. She was my maternal grandmother Grace Amelia Boak Goode. The very next year Christopher Boak died; he was robbed and left sandbagged in the Arizona desert. It is said that he was buried in Kingman, Arizona but we are still searching for his burial site.

Molly & I had the opportunity to meet one of our distant cousins and her family in April, when they were in Austin, Texas. Bessie Jo Hawes Almerico is a direct descendant of Isaac Hawes, Sr., and a member of our Hawes family association. I wrote a little about our visit on page 7.

Dr. George Hambrick and I played telephone tag for about two weeks in April. Finally, we talked and it was wonderful to hear him talk about our family history. He talked about our Hawes, Coleman, Montague, Walker and Croshaw ancestors, and also about some of the places they had lived. He has many family connections, not just one, but he is a direct descendant of John Coleman, Sr. and Eunice "Nicey" Hawes.

Gini McCreary called a few days ago and gave me a preview of the Hawes Cemetery website that she, her husband Gene and son have set up. She allowed me to look at it online and it is impressive. They will talk about it at the reunion in Kentucky and next quarter I will list the website

address in the newsletter. You will love it.

Bob Powers, one of our newest members and a descendant of Albert Gallatin Hawes, made the wonderful report of his trip to Kentucky in April, appearing on page 6, at my request. I know that you will enjoy this account of his search for his Powers and Hawes families, as much as I did.
