Marie Christy Hawes – Ladue, Missouri

Marie Christy Johnson Hawes, a descendant of one of the founders of St. Louis, Missouri, died on Wednesday March 1, 2006, after a long illness at her home in Ladue. She was 75.

She was descended from city founder Rene Auguste Chouteau and from William Clark of the Lewis and Clark expedition. Her grandfather Oscar Johnson was a founder of the old International Shoe Company.

Mrs. Hawes was a 1948 graduate of Mary Institute, where she excelled in sports. She was a horsewoman and rode with the Bridlespur Hunt Club. She attended the former Bradford Junior College. She married Richard Simrall Hawes III, in 1950. He died last year.

The couple supported charitable causes involving education, religion and medical research, including the Churchill School and Center in St. Louis County and the Mary Institute and Country Day School.

Last year, the couple established an endowed professorship at Washington University School of Medicine in honor of Dr. W. Donald Gay.

A funeral Mass was celebrated at Annunziata Catholic Church, Clayton and Celia roads in Ladue, at noon on March 3, 2006. Interment was private.

Among survivors are three daughters, Felicite "Lissy" Hawes Pollnow and Eleanor Hawes Brennan, both of Ladue, and Christy Hawes Bond of Wayne, Illinois; a son, Richard Bartow Hawes of Frontenac; a sister, Eleanor Johnson Moore of Ladue; 15 grandchildren; and six great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Marie Christy Johnson Hawes was a beloved mother, grandmother, great-grandmother, sister and the widow of Richard Simrall Hawes III. All of her children and many of her grandchildren are members of our Hawes Family Association, including three of our new members this quarter. Her family has been one of our association's biggest supporters, since its foundation.

Mrs. Hawes had a historical pedigree, of her own, but she insured that her children were aware of their Hawes heritage as well. Christy Hawes Bond, her daughter, wrote the family history book, "Gateway Families", a beautiful, fact-filled, and interesting documentation of the family lines of both her parents. You may find it in the genealogical section in many libraries, as well as on file at the Library of Congress.

This wonderful lady and her family supported the participation of Richard Simrall Hawes III, in our Hawes family's quest to find our European ancestors. They encouraged him to test for our Hawes DNA study. He was one of the earliest participants.

Owensboro, Kentucky Reunion – June 2006

The Hawes/Thompson family gathered on Father's Day, at the home of Lindy & Abbie Hawes Mercer. A lovely shaded area was set up under a canopy of trellis and vines and huge trees, on their beautiful lawn. Many tables and chairs were available for the large group in attendance. As all of you there already know, some very heavy thunderstorms caused us to move indoors, into their lovely home. It couldn't have been nicer, so I suspect that Lindy & Abbie and their family had made back-up plans, just in case Mother Nature did not cooperate.

The down side of having to move indoors was that there was no opportunity to visit with everyone. I know that there were some in attendance whom I didn't even see. But on the other hand, it provided an opportunity to visit in smaller groups and get to better know some of our family. One of those visits was with the daughters of Samuel Wright Hawes (1890-1956) & Laura Alice Cobb Hawes. Their reminiscences about their youth and having to leave the area because of the great flood of 1937 on the Ohio River, reminded me that my daddy, Lloyd Clark "Buck" Hawes, then serving in the United States Coast Guard had gone from Freeport, Texas to Hawesville, Kentucky on a Coast Guard cutter, as a part of the 1937 flood rescue efforts. He was not quite twenty-one and I was just a few months old when he made that trip via the Mississippi River to the Ohio River. But he told me the story, of seeing a town in Kentucky with our family name, many times through the years. Years later my aunt and uncle, Joe D. & Marjorie Goode Hawes, finding his name in a telephone book at the public library, corresponded with Col. Benjamin Walker Hawes of Owensboro, learning that there were still Haweses and other descendants of Richard & Clary Walker Hawes, in the Daviess County – Hancock County areas. They subsequently met Col. Ben on a trip to the area.

Some of the regulars usually at our reunions were not there this year. They were missed. I felt their absence even more because I will not be able to attend next year. Molly Hawes Rader (my cousin) and Joy Hawes Bunch (my sister) traveled with me to the reunion. Molly & I stopped in Arkansas, on our trip from Texas, to pick up Joy. She was visiting her son, John and his family in Bismarck. We borrowed her for a few days.

The food, always a centerpiece at family gatherings, was excellent. The star, naturally, was the Kentucky ham, and it appeared that everyone brought all their best side dishes. Everything was delicious.

But the people are what made it a special day.

Lanie Hawes Storrie (1875-1934) – Newest Memorial Member

Lanie Hawes Storrie's granddaughter, Rita Bryant Turner, arranged for this memorial membership earlier this year. I have not confirmed some of my family tree information shown here, with sources. Please use caution, if you add it to your family tree. Although most of the information is supported by United States Census records, I need to do more research. The Hawes line of Lanie Hawes Glaze Storrie follows.

Lanie Hawes Glaze married James Benjamin Storrie (1859 -1938), on August 26, 1885, in Linden, Texas. Their eight children included two sets of twins. The names of their children were: William C., Rufus H., Flora, Clarence, Henry Grady, Homer, Mary, and Florence. Lanie Hawes Glaze Storrie was the daughter of:

GLEANINGS FROM BALDWIN & JONES COUNTIES, GEORGIA

Molly Hawes Rader, Joy Hawes Bunch, & I drove from the Kentucky reunion to Milledgeville, Georgia and then to Gray, Georgia. The courthouses were within twenty miles of each other. We spent three full days searching court records for information about the Haweses and any of their known or suspected allied families. Georgia did not officially record births or deaths until 1908. We had to rely upon wills & their probate, records of marriages, deeds, records of lawsuits, and land lottery records. Many of the large, heavy record books were not in good condition. Some records were faded and the Xerox machine in the courthouse at Jones County appeared to be one designed for home-use, and it had no choice of paper-size. But we did our best to copy any records that did pertain to our family, or that we thought might connect.

We knew that three of the sons of William Hawes of Lincoln County, Georgia (b. 1762, in Essex County, VA; d. 1801, in Lincoln County, Georgia) and his wife Elizabeth (about whom we know very little, except that after William's death she married Francis Pickett, in 1803) lived in the part of Baldwin County, GA that later became Jones County. Those sons were Claiborne (c1782-1826), Richard (b. 1790), and Newton. We know nothing else about their son, Burton Hawes (b. 1781).

Claiborne Hawes married Sally "Dicey" Pickett; Richard Hawes married Charlotte Gay; and we did not find any record of Newton Hawes after his being shown as entitled to draw two sections in the 1820 land lottery. He may have died before he could actually draw.

We found a map of the old military districts in Jones County, but it was not the original military district map. Drawing records of one of the early eighteen-hundreds lotteries showed one district called Capt. Hawse's District (one showed the person drawing as Capt. Claborn Haws). On another page it was shown as the Haws District. The old military district map that we saw posted in the Jones County courthouse did not include the Hawes District, of any spelling. The 1820 lottery showed that a few of those entitled to draw in the Haws District were: Claborn Haws, Newton Haws, the orphans of Bartlett Haws, and Ezekiel Harvius or Hawus; each entitled to draw twice. Footnotes noted that most of those entitled to draw had served in the Indian Wars or were orphans of those serving.

Although I have spent quite a lot of time analyzing the one-hundred plus records we copied, I haven't finished and I haven't made copies for others that are promised. One is a deed of the sale of 118 acres of land in Jones County, by Barnett Haws on November 22, 1834, for \$600. It was section 139, in the eighth district. And another is a deed of sale from Claborn Haws to William Gay. I have transcribed that deed here, on page 7, because it contains so many names of those owning adjoining property.

Four Haws/Hawes names not previously known to me were found; Henry M. Haws and Elizabeth Reynolds were married on December 28, 1834, in Jones County; Nancy Haws purchased land in 1835 (maiden name Hawes or a widow Hawes?); Bartlett Haws orphans above; and Mitchell Haws witnessed several land transfer (deed) transactions for members of the Reynolds family, around 1830. Our Richard Hawes, whom married Charlotte Gay, was also a witness to the will of Benjamin Reynolds, when it was written in 1833, and probated in 1835. Benjamin Reynolds and his family were neighbors to our Claiborne Hawes and this Richard Hawes. (See the deed on page 7.) A typed copy of the 1850 Census for Jones County showed Toliver Haws, but when I checked the copy of original records, I found that he was Toliver Harris. We found quite a few records for Picketts.

Sally "Dicey" Pickett Hawes, widow of Claiborne Hawes, married (2nd) Hope Hull Slatter. She was his second wife, and he had a third not too many years after that. He was the sheriff of Jones County, when they married, and he sold hundreds of parcels of land belonging to estates of Jones County people, and received a percentage or set amounts. His family came to Jones County from Maryland and the records are full of the marriages & inheritances, of his mother, brother, & sister. We found no will for Sally "Dicey" Pickett Haws Slatter, and we found no distribution of Claiborne's estate. If Sheriff Slatter sold the land of his Haws step-children so that a distribution could be made, we did not find the record. We were suspicious and we looked for hours. Maybe I just have a suspicious mind.

Transcript of Deed Record

Jones County, Georgia
Deed Book N –page 228

This indenture made this first day of June one thousand eight hundred twenty two [June 1, 1822] between Claborn Haws of Jones County State of Georgia of the one part William Gay of the same state & county of the other part. Witnesseth that for in consideration of the sum of two thousand fifty seven dollars fifty seven cents to me in hand paid at & before the delivery of those present the receipt where of is hereby acknowledged hath bargained sold & conveyed unto said William Gay his heirs & assigns a certain tract or parcel of land containing one hundred & seventy six acres 2 ¼ more or less being in this tenth district Jones County the same being part lot No. 197 joining Benjamin Reynolds, John L. Blackburn & John Williams also eight acres part lot number one hundred ninety six sold by Claborn Haws to William Gay to be laid off in the southwest corner of said lot bounded on two sides by Richard Haws & William Gay together with all & singular the rights members & appendinances there unto belonging to the said Haws doth warrant & forever defend the aforesaid tracts or parcels of land promises of priviledges against all other claims whatsoever unto him the said William Gay his heirs & assigns. In witness where of I have here and let my hand seal the day & year above written.

[Note: I do not believe that Claborn sold all of his Jones County, Georgia land, with this transaction. He had drawn for parcels of land in several lotteries. He died in 1826 in Jones County and had a will. In his will he named his wife Dicey (Sally Pickett Hawes) and stated that his estate should be divided if and when she remarried, between his daughter Sarah (not yet married) and his other minor children, whom he did not identify by name.]

HAWES DNA STUDY UPDATE

There have been no new matches to our Hawes line since last quarter. Our group of those tested has grown to twenty-four, and a twenty-fifth kit was mailed this week to a new Hawes participant in North Carolina. His family tree on paper is not conclusive, when it comes to his early ancestors. But some of his ancestors did live in Virginia.

I was contacted this month by the relative of a Hawes participant in a DNA study, at a testing company other than the one we use. He told me that his relative matched the results of our Samuel Hawes of Virginia group. They believed that their immigrant ancestor came from Scotland. I was excited for one day, until I went to the other company's website and made the comparison myself. His relative was not a match to us or to any other Hawes family participating in our study. Not being familiar with comparing results, this man had chosen only the matching markers to compare, instead of all the markers.

The Mayflower Society's June quarterly magazine included an article about the acceptance of DNA results by them, as proof of the direct line of an applicant to their society, whom was previously declined for missing proof of a generation or two in his line. Their example was the acceptance into their society of a descendant of John Hawes & Desire Gorham, one of the participants in our Hawes DNA Study. My thanks to Kathleen Keegahn, our cousin in Washington State, for sending me a copy of the magazine.

We will accept donations to cover the cost of additional DNA tests, from anyone willing to donate. One Y-DNA 37-marker test is now \$189.00, down a hundred dollars since we began at the end of 2004. Any help will be appreciated.

I always find pleasure in hearing from you. Your news cannot appear here without your input. I welcome any family tree information that you are able to share with me, too. And I especially appreciate any information that corrects data that is wrong in my records.

John Morris Hawes, Jr. and his family have invited me to come up to Waco, Texas to meet them sometime when I can and when they are going to be at home. We are trying to work out a time convenient to all of us. I hope that a few of my kin in this area can join me. I know that my schedule is filling up for this fall. Perhaps we can meet in the spring. We will keep you posted.

My heart felt thanks to Christy Hawes Bond. She is responsible for the membership of three of our new association members this quarter, her children.

Our new association member, Helen Warren of New Mexico, is a descendant of James W. Hawes. James W. Hawes (born in Ohio, according to census records) is the ancestor of the newest Hawes DNA match to our Hawes line in our study, by Helen's relative Raymond Jerry Hawes. We still have not found the connection between Samuel Hawes of Caroline County, VA and James W. Hawes, but we will. He moved to Texas and died in the Civil War. We know that DNA tests do not lie.

In our last newsletter, I gave you my educated guess that Claiborne Hawes of Baldwin & Jones Counties of Georgia was the father of Barnett Haws. I still strongly believe that, but I had hoped to find some record in Georgia that would confirm it. So far I haven't. Barnett's descendant, Bentley Hause of Texas, matched the other Samuel Hawes descendants in our DNA study. Beverly Hansen of Texas, one of Barnett's other descendants, has been doing a lot of research, also. She does very professional research. She joined our association last quarter. I met her through Jack Scarborough of Victoria, Texas, Bentley's nephew.

We look forward to the payment of dues, by those of you whom might have overlooked sending them. I am reluctant to remove members from our membership list, except due to death or a specific request from someone to be removed. Oh yes, that does happen. Dues have remained at ten dollars, since Anna Hawes Greaves, Helen Hawes Hudgins, and other pioneers of our family established this association in 1989. Costs of postage and materials have increased, but we still remain in fairly good financial shape due to some generous donations. Eventually those will be used up and I get nervous as I watch our bottom line shrink. Dues alone can still sustain our association annually, if everyone remembers to pay. And I must acknowledge that our bottom line is in better condition today, than it would be, because some of you have paid several years in advance. If those paying ahead had not, I fear that we would be in much worse shape financially. Sorry for my nagging.
