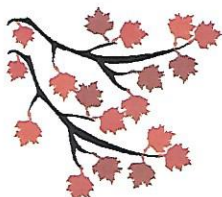



Purpose of Hawes Family Association:

To continue to collect and preserve family histories of Hawes people and allied families; to share our knowledge of family histories and to strengthen extended family ties.

THOMAS HAWES

Thomas Hawes, son of Isaac Hawes, Sr. and Elizabeth Burton, was born in 1747 in Caroline County, Virginia. He was named in his father's will and appears on the tax lists in 1782 and disappears from the Caroline tax lists in 1788.

He was probably the Thomas Hawes, Ensign, Caroline Militia, recommended April 8, 1779 2nd Lt. of a new company to be raised in May of 1782. *Gwathmey's Virginians in the Revolution*, page 360.

In 1832, one Thomas Lewis stated that he had been born in Caroline County in 1764 and that he had served in. (see page 3)

(Continued from Thomas Hawes, page 2) Virginia, in the Revolution under Col. Thomas Matthews and he named one Thomas Hawes of Kentucky as a witness to his service. *Virginia Magazine of History & Biography*, VIII, p. 203.

In about 1765 Thomas married, in Virginia, Elizabeth Fisher. Thomas was twenty-one years of age when his son, Isaac, was born; he was forty-one years of age when he went to Kentucky, arriving in Fayette County in 1788, moving to Woodford County, then to Scott County, and then, in 1808 to Gallatin County.

The Virginia War Pension & Bounty Land Warrant records give all the statistics on Thomas; it further shows that on February 17, 1807 he married Susanna Edmondson and that she received a widow's pension. Thomas lived to be eighty-six years of age and while we do not know the date of death for his first wife, Elizabeth Fisher, we see that he did marry a second time when he was sixty years of age.

Thomas may have had other children but we know of only two, Isaac and Ann. Their mother was Elizabeth (Fisher) Hawes:

- (1) Isaac Hawes, born October 17, 1768, in Virginia and died in Kentucky on April 8, 1832. He married Ann C. "Nancy" Redd, born March 8, 1773 in Virginia, she being the daughter of Mordecai Redd and wife, Agatha Minor. Nancy died July 15, 1853 and both she and Thomas are buried in the Pee Wee Valley cemetery in Oldham County, Kentucky.
- (2) Ann Hawes, born in Caroline County, Va. She married Abner Yates, also born in Caroline County, the son of Michael Yates and wife, Martha Marshall. Abner went to Kentucky in 1788; he died January 26, 1791 in Fayette County, Kentucky.

Both Isaac and Ann had descendants and we will meet them in a later issue. All of this information about Thomas Hawes and his family is from *PRESENTING THOMAS HAWES (1747-1833)* by Helen Hawes Hudgins.

Do you know any more about these individuals? When was Ann Hawes born, when did she marry, and when did she die? If you do, please share with us.

Two Hundred Years Ago

Most of the descendants of Isaac Hawes, Sr. had migrated to Lincoln County, Georgia and Edgefield County, South Carolina, on both sides of the Savannah River, after selling their land in Virginia. Many of his descendants still live in Lincoln County today.

Richard Hawes and his family were making plans to migrate to Kentucky to take possession of the land Lt. Col. Samuel Hawes received in land grants, signed by President John Adams, for his service in the Revolutionary War. They left for Kentucky in 1810.
