New Memorial Membership

You may have noticed the new memorial membership on page one for Hugh Adrian Hawes (1922-1992). This was arranged for by his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth (McCoy) Hawes of Port O' Connor, Texas to honor him.

He was the son of Alfred Edwin and Mary Josephine "Phenie" (Johnson) Hawes and the grandson of Hugh Walker Hawes, Jr.

A lifelong Texan, Hugh was a rancher all his life but he took time away from that endeavor during World War II to serve as a fighter pilot in the Pacific, serving in the U.S. Army Air Corps. After the war he served as postmaster in Port O' Connor for thirty-three years, from 1947 to 1980.

Hugh married Norma Elizabeth McCoy on December 11, 1943 at Perrin Air Force Base in Sherman, Texas. They have six daughters, all of whom live in Texas, Beth, Kathleen, Martha, Norma Claire, Anne, and Gloria.

"George Washington's War, The Saga of the American Revolution" by Robert Leckie. Chapter 68 tells of the one of the battles of Lt. Col. Samuel Hawes.

John Aylett, the immigrant arrived in Virginia from Braxted Magna, Essex County, England on March 19, 1653, when he was twenty-one years of age. He was a Royalist and left England to escape imprisonment in the Tower of London and/or death. He changed his name from the family name of Aylofffe when he came to the Colonies. King Charles II gave him patents for 8,000 acres in King William County, Virginia in gratitude for his service and additional bequests of 12,000 acres later. He was the maternal great, great grandfather of Anne Walker who married Samuel Hawes II of Caroline County, Virginia on June 20, 1751. This is the origin of the name **Aylett** which appears so often in our Hawes family.

Many of you may have the following recipe, but some may not. For that reason I am including it in this issue of the newsletter. I wish you could have had it prior to the holidays and not after them. This recipe is said to have been in our Hawes family since at least 1740.

BLACK CAKE

1 lb. flour
1 lb. sugar
1 heavy lb. butter
2½ lbs. raisins
1½ lbs. currants
2 lbs. citron
1 dozen eggs
2 nutmegs, grated

1 teaspoon ground cloves
1 teaspoon ground ginger
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon orange juice
1 teacup nuts, ground fine
1/3 cup New Orleans molasses

Cream butter and sugar; beat eggs well, and add; then stir in flour, beating very hard; add fruit last. Have some of the flour to dredge fruit in, so it will not go to the bottom of the cake. Bake 3 hours and leave in pan until cold.

Richard Ellington Hawes

Rear Admiral Richard E. Hawes, b. February 21, 1893, d. December 30, 1968 is a descendant of Isaac Hawes, Sr. He was born and died in Thomson, Georgia.

He attended the University of Georgia and later transferred to Mercer University, where he earned a law degree. He choose to play professional baseball instead of taking the bar exam.

When America entered World War I in 1917, Richard enlisted in the Navy as a Fireman Second Class. He progressed in rank and in March 1926 he joined USS Falcon as Executive Officer. He received his first Navy Cross for part of this service. . . .

As a Lieutenant in 1940, Hawes assumed command of the USS Pigeon and was serving on it when the United States entered World War II. On December 10, 1941 while the Pigeon was docked in Manila Bay for repairs, Japanese planes attacked. He was instrumental in saving both the Pigeon and the minesweeper Quail to which they were lashed. Also, after separating from the Quail and seeing that the submarine Seadragon was in grave danger and about to be engulfed by bombs and fire, Richard maneuvered the Pigeon back to the flaming dock and hauled the helpless submarine stern first from her berth while under heavy strafing and bombing. He received his second Navy Cross for his service in that battle and the Pigeon was awarded the Presidential Unit Citation, the first warship to receive the award in World War II. During that same month they received a second Presidential Unit Citation and the Pigeon was the only surface warship to win two such awards in World War II.

Except for brief periods when he was in transit or putting USS Chanticleer and USS Anthedon into commission, Hawes spent virtually of World War II at sea in the Pacific in command of his three ships. Like himself, his ships always had a reputation for efficiency and readiness. He received the Bronze Star for his command of the Anthedon.

Richard was promoted to Captain in 1945 and in 1952 retired and was promoted to Rear Admiral. The USS Hawes FFG 53 is still in service and was named for him
