EMPORIA, KANSAS — Deanna J. Hawes, 58, an Emporia State University professor, of Lake Kahola, died October 18, 2001, at the University of Kansas Medical Center. She was born July 1, 1943, at Auburn, Nebraska, to Dean and Betty Cox. After her father's death she was adopted by Ray Tankersley. She graduated from ESU in 1965 with a bachelor's degree in elementary education. In 1982 she received a master's degree in early childhood education and elementary counseling and received a doctorate from Kansas State University in 1987 in counselor education and educational psychology.

For many years she was actively involved in professional organizations in her field and was a recognized expert in her profession. The Kansas School Counselors Association named her outstanding post-secondary counselor of the year in 1996-1997. The U.S. Dept. of Education called on her to review grants in her chosen field.

Each year our family has a chuckle and also a fond memory of Jim's mother as that shirt is exchanged.

One night we were at Patsy Hawes Gordon's home and she opened the closet door. On that door were pencil markings which denoted the heights of family members tabulated since 1921. That's quite a tradition! Each year Patsy has an eggnog party with the most wonderful eggnog ever made - using a recipe belonging to her grandmother!

Years ago my husband and our children started saying "I love you" at the end of each telephone conversation. This has become as common as putting on your seatbelt before taking off in the car - and to us there is a similarity. Families are not always together in body at the holidays, but in spirit and love.

Whether it is a favorite family dish, like our scalloped oysters served yearly in the same old baking dish, or a 30-year-old white shirt our traditions bind us together. They preserve the past even as each new generation adds a different twist; this continuity helps make each family unique.

The town of Calhoun, in McLean County, Kentucky was at first named Calhoon. It was named for our John Calhoon, it's first circuit judge. Years later, after John C. Calhoun (no relation), southern "States Rights" advocate, became popular the spelling was changed to Calhoun. It is obvious, from their tombstones, that the children of John Calhoon also began using the "Calhoun" spelling.
