OUR LOVED ONE, GONE AHEAD TO A BETTER PLACE, TO WAIT FOR US

Dayton, Texas - Travis Lloyd Hawes, the twelve year old son of David Alan & Stephanie Hawes, died here on Thursday, March 13, 2003, in a tragic accident. His parents and sister, Jamie, survive Travis. He was born December 28, 1990. Lloyd & Alma Hawes, of Victoria, Texas, are Travis's grandparents; his great-grandmother Mary Nell Hawes resides in Victoria. Preceding him in death were his great-grandparents, Albert & Muriel Drouin and Lloyd Clark "Buck" Hawes. Travis was a descendant of Hugh Walker Hawes.

Hugh Walker Hawes 1798-1883

My great-great grandfather's first marriage took place in New Orleans, Louisiana in 1829. I am descended from his second marriage to Corilla Calhoun of Kentucky, but I have gathered as much information as I could about his first family.

Recently I discovered a book with information about his first family that I had not seen before, "Marriages and Family Relationships 1830-1840", transcribed from French language public records of various New Orleans registrars into an index, by Charles R. Maduell, Jr., in 1969. Bold print will identify any new information from his book, from transcribed Book 3, page 117.

The first wife of Hugh Walker Hawes was Marie Martha Juliette Justine DeRion. Her mother Aimee was identified as Jeanne Justine Desbreu (probably Aimee Jeanne Justine Desbreu).

Robert Coleman of Drysdale Parish, Caroline County, VA, to his son, John Coleman. Deed of Gift. 316 acres, in Spotsylvania County, part of a patent granted said Robert, December 2, 1723. Witnesses, Ed. Wiat, Samuel Hawes, Thomas Coleman, Wiat Coleman. Recorded February 4, 1745. Dated 1745. Source: Spotsylvania County Records, Deed Book D 1742-1751.

Amendment to Declaration of John Pettis. John Pettis of Spts. Co. aged 78. Enlisted in Army of U.S. in 1780 with Samuel Coleman, and served in 1st Regiment Virginia Line under Col. Samuel Hawes, Capt. Francis Cowherd, and General Green; lived in County of Caroline, when he entered the service; marched through States of North and South Carolina, was at Battles of Guilford C.H. and Eutaw Springs, and finally marched to Salisbury, and there discharged about January ____, 1782, making tour of service 1 year, 6 months, etc. Source: Revolutionary Pensioners, From Order Book 1829-1832, Spotsylvania County, Virginia, Court. [Entitled to provision by an Act of Congress, passed June 7, 1838, for service in the Continental Army during the American Revolution 1776-1783.1 (More, Page 4)

May 20, 1793. Samuel Hawes [II] of Caroline County, Gentleman, to James Crawford, Jr., Spotsylvania County, 17 pounds 12 shillings currency for 22 acres in Spotsylvania County, etc., etc. Witnesses: John Carnehan, Moroday Morris, Stephen Humphries, Joseph Carnehan. Recorded September 3, 1793. Source: Spotsylvania County Records, Deed Book N 1791-1794.

February 6, 1793. "I, Wm. Threldkeld, do hereby agree to give from under my hand to Mrs. Mary Coleman that she should have and hold her property, etc., during her life, and at her death to dispose of as she thinks proper. I also agree . . . that I will never meddle nor concern with any of her property, etc., without her consent." Witnesses, Wm. Marshall Estes, Frankey x Wheeler. Recorded September 3, 1793. Source: Spotsylvania County Records, Deed Book N 1791-1794.

Letter from Brother to Sister - 1943

The following letter was written to me, from my younger brother, Lloyd Hawes, in the spring of 1943. Our grandpa, Lloyd William Hawes, the best grandfather anyone could have had, put the words to paper, since Lloyd was only four years old at the time and I was six. We had a new baby sister, Carol Jean, and I had the whooping cough. Although we usually deal here with family history that is much older, this touched my heart when I came across it this week. Grandpa was a rancher and a retired thirty-year Coast Guard man. Lloyd was visiting Granny & Grandpa in Port O'Connor, Texas and I was in Freeport, Texas, at Surfside, where our family lived and our daddy was stationed with the Coast Guard. It was a different time.

My Dearest little curley headed Sister,

I will answer your letter which I received several days ago. I have been helping Grandpa with the cow. I can milk a little. I rode the calf, too. We went down to [Aunt] Evelyn's house tonight. I go down there and eat dinner with them sometimes.

I was all ready to go see you all when we heard you had that cough. I was glad to see David John [one year old son of Joe D. & Marjorie Hawes & my first cousin], he sure is cute. How is my little sister Carol Jean? I want to see her too. I wish you all could see me, I am a big boy now. I say yes sir and no sir all the time.

Sister, as soon as school is out you all must come down here and stay a long time. We look every day for Marjorie and David [Uncle Joe was away serving his country.]

I am sleepy now so will have to go to bed.

Dr. Edwin Gallatin Coleman, born February 20, 1848, was the son of Hawes Harris Coleman, the son of Ann Walker Hawes, the oldest child and daughter of Richard & Clary Walker Hawes

Dr. Coleman married Mamie Boodie in about 1877 and they had four children; Earnest Godfrey Coleman b. May 7, 1878, Edith Coleman b. January 26, 1880, Frederick Hughes Coleman b. December 23, 1881, and Mary Gildersleeve Coleman b. March 16, 1884.

Do you know more about Edwin, his wife Mamie Boodie, or their children? I would appreciate additional information. Edwin died on June 5, 1885.

SIMON BOLIVAR BUCKNER

General of the Confederacy & Governor of Kentucky

Simon Bolivar Buckner was born on April 1, 1823, the third child of Aylett Hartswell & Elizabeth Ann Morehead Buckner in Hart County, Kentucky, near Mumfordville. He was the great-great-great grandson of William & Anne Tayloe Aylett and John & Debora Ferrers Buckner, all of Virginia. There are many Hawes marriages in both lines.

Buckner graduated from West Point in 1844, where he taught for two years after graduation, then saw action in the Mexican American War. He entered the Confederate Army as a brigadier general, in September 1861. In February 1862, after his two senior officers escaped to safety, he surrendered Fort Donelson, Kentucky to General Grant. He was exchanged later in 1862 and commanded a wing of Bragg's army at Chickamauga.

After the War Between the States he was an editor of a Louisville, Kentucky newspaper and served as Democratic governor of Kentucky from 1887 to 1892. He was a candidate for Vice President of the United States in 1896.

Simon Bolivar Buckner attended schools in Kentucky; he received an appointment to West Point and for the first time in his life headed east, traveling by stagecoach and boat. He was impressed by the growth of the towns and cities and found their hustle and bustle exciting. He was physically strong and excelled in all sports, especially gymnastics. When Buckner wanted to go to New York City, a distance of fifty miles, he just walked over and back. He usually stopped at Tarrytown, about mid-way, and the people there became accustomed to his walks and chats, even watching for him to appear on the horizon.

While serving in the Army and on duty near New York, Buckner met Mary Kingsbury and they married at Old Lyme, Connecticut, on May 2, 1850. She was of a prominent and wealthy family. They had an son; he died while still an infant, during the Mexican War. There was difficulty in getting Mary a pass to take their son to his place of burial, past enemy lines.

In 1855 Simon resigned from the Army. He and Mary had a daughter, Lily; she was born on March 7, 1858. His Kentucky homeplace that they had returned to, was renamed Glen Lily in their daughter's honor. Buckner served in the Confederacy, as a brigideer general, for the duration of the War Between the States. Mary Kingsbury Buckner died in 1874.

Buckner, on June 10, 1885, at age 62, surprised everyone except the members of his household, when he married Miss Delia Claiborne, of Virginia. She was more than thirty years his junior and the granddaughter of Maria Dandridge Bassett, the sister of Martha (Mrs. George) Washington, and she was closely related to Robert E. Lee. Their son, Simon Bolivar Buckner, Jr. was born at Glen Lily on July 18, 1886.

Simon Bolivar Buckner, Sr. was elected governor of Kentucky in 1887 and served through 1891. After his term as governor, he, Delia, and their son traveled extensively. In 1900 they added their nephew to their small group and went to Europe for a tour of the Continent. In their travels they visited many distinguished and influential families in America. Among those visits was a visit in the White House, with President Theodore Roosevelt. While a guest, Buckner asked the President if he would consider giving his son an appointment to West Point. President Roosevelt did so, at that moment.

Buckner died on January 8, 1914, at age ninety-one, only being sick for two days before his death.

Martin Van Buren Hawes

Martin was born in 1844 and was a musician & private in Georgia's Company E, 31 Infantry, from May 1, 1862. He was captured Fredericksburg, Va. December 18, 1862. Exchanged. Appointed Color-Bearer. Captured in South Mountain, Maryland July 4, 1863. Paroled in February 1865 and exchanged at James River, Virginia in March 1865. He returned home to Georgia after the Civil War and then left to look for work as a music teacher. No further record has been found of him. Letters • & money he sent to his family, so that they might join him, were destroyed 1 by a person who intercepted them, it was learned years later. He was a descendant of Isaac Hawes, Sr. and is the ancestor of T.J. Hawes of Gainesville, Florida. Will you look for him when you do research?
