1993 begins the fourth year of our family association, and we are glad to welcome four new members. They are:



Joanne Hawes Stoe also sent in a Memorial Membership, honoring her father, Lloyd Clark Hawes (1916-1981), one of the Texas descendants of Hugh Walker Hawes and his second wife. They have received all the material we have prepared thus far and we hope they will have a happy membership.

I have been writing about the Historical Marker for a long time but now will tell you about the dedication ceremony. To begin, Saturday, October 24, 1992, in Kentucky, was a perfect day. Blue skies and warm sunshine, with soft breezes which had all the brightly-colored Fall leaves actually dancing above us. The waters of both lakes, Carpenter and Kingfisher, were sparkling. That quiet little road became busy while cars were being parked and the large group of people entered the cemetery grounds. Everything was immaculate -- the grass was freshly mowed; all the tree limbs and boughs which used to hang low were now neatly trimmed back. Everything was SO CLEAN. Chairs had been set up inside the fence (OH, THE FENCE...IT IS NEW, thanks to all the Hawes men who worked so hard getting ready for this day). Abbie Catherine Hawes Mercer had set up a little refreshment corner and was dishing up squares of gingerbread and her husband, Lindy, was opening bottles of cooling drinks. Louise Hawes Applegate kept a lovely Guest Register

and in every direction you could see happy children, running and laughing, while the older people were getting re-acquainted or meeting for the first time.

Our president, Anna Hawes Greaves presided over the program. Mrs. Aloma Dew, president of Daviess County Historical Society was the first speaker; next, a message was given by Jack Foster, as he traced the meaning of today from "the idea" only. He is a dynamic speaker and he and his wife, Mildred, represented Hancock County. We were all able to meet Dr. David Orrahood, who had helped us with the "paper work". Then, amid the many oh's and ah's, the Marker was unveiled. It is VERY HANDSOME and VERY LARGE. The workmanship is outstanding.



Next - and nice - was an honor extended to "Cousin" Irene Jones. The State of Kentucky had bestowed upon her the honorary commission of KENTUCKY COLONEL -- now it was framed and ready for her. She had requested that I make the presentation, and since such a privilege seldom comes my way, I spoke of her many accomplishments in life. So, there we were:

Irene on her walker And I on my cane Both of us thankful And glad that we came!

One of the visitors was a Mr. Roy Hawes, of Louisville, whose daughter, Betty Hawes Gentry, brought him to the spot. This straight-as-an-arrow tall and smiling man, now in his mid 80's, enjoyed meeting everyone. He is descended from the Benjamin Hawes who was born in Wales and who came to America, marring in Virginia a Miss Rebecca Clements. Some of their sons came to Kentucky and settled in what was then Logan County, but from records in my file, many descendants of this Benjamin Hawes are now in Ohio and Butler Counties, Ky. This visitor was not descended from our Samuel Hawes I, but he is a Hawes, regardless, and there is most likely a link somewhere in the past - before their coming to America.

The closing remarks were made by our president -- Anna Hawes Greaves. She thanked the members for their loyalty...for their special contributions toward the cost of the marker, and she thanked the cemetery's Board of Directors for their cooperation and help -- plus all the physical labor which went into making it a very special day for all those present.

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Recently appearing in Hancock County's Genealogical Society publication, FORGOTTEN PATHWAYS is a tidbit. Taken from the records and carrying the date of January 1833, we learn the following:

MARK ADAMS TAJZLER was born June 27, 1992. He is the second child of Jane Craig McGilly and husband, Roman Tajzler. Our member Mary Emily (Birk) McGilly, of Atlanta, is his maternal grandmother and she reports this young fellow has already done some traveling...the Christmas holidays found him enroute to England (with his parents, of course).

Since Mary Emily has sent her family history, I think this is a very fine name given him -- explanation follows.

Mary Emily is the daughter of Louis Adams Birk and his first wife, Elinar Curwen Bell.

Louis was the son of Mary Ann Hawes, who at the age of 20, married George Birk on 5-30-1882; she was his second wife.

Mary Ann Hawes was the daughter of Richard Walker Hawes (first child of Benjamin Walker Hawes and wife, Mary Ann Taylor) who married Georgetta Adams (1840-1885).


Georgetta was the daughter of William Adams and wife, Mary Ann Bright. The Adams family was one of the early settlers in Hancock County, Ky. My notes read that it was John Adams who came to Kentucky on a raft and moved his family to Hawesville in 1808...he was in the War of 1812. His son was William Adams (above) father of Georgetta. John Adams settled on a 1,000 acre farm, extending from the Ohio River

to Vastwood Park and he built a home there in 1818.

Georgetta's two brothers also married into the family of Benjamin Walker Hawes -- her brother John Quincy Adams married Sarah Elizabeth (Bettie) Hawes (she was his first wife); and her brother Jesse B. Adams married Hetty Gibson Hawes ----both girls being daughters of Benjamin Walker Hawes.

The Bright-Adams-Hawes histories are very intriguing. When MARK ADAMS TAJZLER grows up and learns to read, he'll like his history -- don't you think?

(Mrs. Jack) Very recently a Hawes-Adams descendant, Mrs Eula Margaret Wiles, sent me some information about the Adams family and enclosed a picture of The Adams Homestead. The Wiles live in this house and she said that it had been the home - also - of Hetty Gibson Hawes who had married Jesse B. Adams. She also said this sketch was made about 1930 and had appeared in the Louisville Courior Journal. It is reproduced below:
